Uniform Reminder

Jewellery such as bracelets and necklaces are not to be worn at school. Watches may be worn and must be analogue only. However, it is recommended that they are most suitable in Key Stage 2 (Year 3 and 4). 'SMART' watches and pedometers are not permitted.

Earrings must not be worn in school. If you are considering allowing your child to have piercings, it is helpful for this to take place during a school holiday in order that the piercing can be 'fixed' before the child's return to school. Where this is not possible, they must be taped until the hole is 'fixed', after which time earrings must be removed while your child is in school.

This Week:

To help support you at home and to spark conversations about learning, here is what the children have been covering this week.

	English	Mathematics
EYFS	This week has been focussed on love. We talked about different kinds of love and challenged ourselves to show small acts of kindness this week. We have been making Valentine's Day cards so keep an eye out in book bags! In Literacy, we have been writing captions using our Phase 3 sounds and recapping all the sounds and tricky words we have learnt this term.	In Maths, we have been learning about odd and even numbers as well as learning to recall our doubles!
Year 1	In English this week the children have worked hard on sequencing the story of Do Not Wash this Bear! They used pictures to help them order their ideas and then focussed on their vocabulary to make their sentences even more interesting. The children used the vocabulary bank that we developed as a class to help them change the adjectives in the story.	This week in maths the children have been securing their number bonds to 20. They found links and patterns between number bonds to 10 and number bonds to 20 to help them complete addition problems. They were also introduced to the idea of doubling as another form of addition.
Year 2	This week in English we have continued to read the book 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers. We have spent time investigating the features of newspapers, what information they include, what tense they are written in and how they catch the reader's attention. The children have shown great imagination and written an article reporting on the penguin escaping from the zoo. They have had some very inventive ideas and have worked really hard to incorporate the vocabulary from the book in their writing.	In Maths this week we have continued our multiplication and division unit. We have learnt how multiplication and repeated addition number sentences represent groups in different ways and how multiplication can be represented as 'lots of' 'groups of' and a 'x' symbol. We have investigated how arrays can display data and made equal groups by grouping. 'Your one minute maths task is: multiplication: equal groups (objects) and count in 3s'
Year 3	This week, year 3 have explored non - chronological texts even further by creating their own all about Anglo- Saxons. They had to include the features and use their research to put into their own sentences. I have been really impressed with their presentation and handwriting.	We have had a fun week in maths exploring perimeter. They had to practically measure the perimeter of 2D shapes and calculated the perimeter of different weird and wonderful types of shapes. Alongside this, the children had to not only convert mm to cm but find the most appropriate way to add up different measurements.
Year 4	In English, the focus has been on different list poems, specifically with an emphasis on using verbs and nouns effectively. The children have enthusiastically delved into this aspect of language, discovering the power of carefully chosen words. Furthermore, they have applied their understanding by creating their own captivating poem titled 'Things I did last week'. This exercise has allowed them to unleash their creativity by incorporating similes, powerful adjectives, interesting verbs, and prepositions.	In maths, our Year 4 learners have been tackling more complex shapes, including rectilinear shapes and regular/irregular polygons. They have fearlessly explored the concept of perimeter and have successfully calculated the missing lengths in problem-solving scenarios related to perimeter. This hands-on approach, combined with the mastery learning style, has enabled the children to develop a deeper understanding of perimeter.
