#### **Uniform Reminder**

Jewellery such as bracelets and necklaces are not to be worn at school. Watches may be worn and must be analogue only. However, it is recommended that they are most suitable in Key Stage 2 (Year 3 and 4). 'SMART' watches and pedometers are not permitted.

**Earrings must not be worn in school**. If you are considering allowing your child to have piercings, it is helpful for this to take place during a school holiday in order that the piercing can be 'fixed' before the child's return to school. Where this is not possible, they must be taped until the hole is 'fixed', after which time earrings must be removed while your child is in school.

While we understand this may be a sad reminder, we hold these rules in place in order to protect the children as they play and engage with PE lessons together. Please support us as we seek to keep our children – and other's children – safe.

# This Week:

To help support you at home and to spark conversations about learning, here is what the children have been covering this week.

	English	Mathematics
EYFS	Spring has sprung! We have been looking for signs of Spring around our playground and using them to inspire our observational drawings, as well as developing our cutting skills by making pancake faces for Shrove Tuesday!	In Maths, we have been exploring length and height and challenging ourselves to measure the length and height of different objects and even each other! We have been using the language of 'taller than', 'shorter than', 'longest' and 'shortest' to compare the length and height of different objects.
	In phonics, we have been recapping our Phase 3 digraphs and trigraphs; making sure we can read and spell them in CVC words as well as building our confidence and fluency with our tricky words. We have been exploring the traditional tale, 'Goldilocks and the 3 bears' by drawing Goldilocks in drawing club and writing sentences to describe her. We have also been writing sentences about our Spring observations learning how to use capital letters, finger spaces and full stops.	
Year 1	This week in English Year 1 started to look at how to write a set of instructions. We looked at the imperative (bossy) verbs in the sentences. We learned actions to help us remember them and then wrote our own set of instructions on how to wash our hands adding in a much details as we could.	In maths this week we have been looking at different methods of subtraction within 20. We looked at patterns of number bonds within 10 and compared these within 20 to help us apply what we already know. We then practised counting backwards on a number line trying to be really careful when drawing our jumps to make sure we counted accurately.  This week in Year 1, we have been learning about number bonds.  You can practise these skills at home using Subtraction -9- Subtract across 10 within 20.
Year 2		In Maths this week we have continued our multiplication and division unit. We have made equal groups by sharing, spent time recognising the 2 times table and how it can help us solve dividing by 2 problems. We have then gone on to double and halve numbers.  'Your one minute maths task is: multiplication: multiply by 2'













English - This week, year 3 have been writing newspaper reporters for Hampreston's great pancake race. We have discussed all the features that go into a newspaper report. The children have shown real enthusiasm for this topic using newspaper language, thinking of catchy headlines and adding some direct quotes in! Great job year 3!

Maths - This week in maths, the children have been learning about fractions, remembering their prior knowledge from year 2 about the numerator and denominator. Year 3 have also learnt about what unit and non-unit fractions are. The children have enjoyed a fractions supermovers to consolidate their learning, whilst the weather hasn't been very friendly this week!

In our English lessons this week, we have been diving into a new text called "The Great Kapok Tree," which aligns perfectly with our Geography focus on sustainability. The children have explored the arguments as to why the tree should not be cut down. Through close reading and discussion, the children identified persuasive techniques and features of persuasive writing within the text. They then put their knowledge into practice by writing persuasive letters from the perspective of a logger to the logging company. These letters showcased their understanding of persuasive techniques and facts they gleaned from the text.

In Maths, our focus has shifted to our new topic of fractions. The children have been delving deep into the concept of fractions, learning what they are and how to count beyond the whole. To aid their comprehension, we have been using number lines as a visual tool. They have also explored the various ways to partition mixed number fractions and have further developed their ability to order and compare them. I have included a link to an online game that will help to cement this learning. The first few levels of each game are going to be the most helpful to practise at home.
